Greetings in Christ! At the close of Princeton's fall semester, we are excited to share how our students seek to "do justice, love kindness, and walk humbly with God" (Micah 6:8). Princeton Presbyterians celebrates our students' pursuit of creative and inspiring studies, and we foster a community that affirms their full humanity as God's children. We often encourage one another with a saying from Mister Rogers: "You are special, and I like you just the way you are."

Your support helps us expand programs like The Oasis, a student-led outdoor gathering focused on play and rest during stressful midterm exams. Average weekly worship attendance has increased in the fall semester. Small group leaders like Isabella, Grecia, Grace, and Maggie have explored themes in the Old Testament. Our Thanksgiving Feast welcomed over fifty-five students and friends, and we collected canned goods for the local non-profit Arm in Arm. We have ambitious plans in 2023 to host a winter retreat down the Jersey Shore, amplify our service work locally, and make a pilgrimage to the Taizé Community in France. 






Revenues
